A TAX CREDIT IS WORTH MORE THAN A TAX DEDUCTION

Please help New Haven Home Recovery, Inc. (NHHR) as they strive to combat the impact of homelessness and poverty on the lives of children and their families.

NHHR is a pre-approved program under The CT Neighborhood Assistance Act (NAA) Tax Credit Program that allows companies to earn tax credits up to \$75,000 each year by donating to pre-approved programs of which **NHHR is approved for a 60% tax credit.**

NHHR was established in 1990 to fill a critical (unmet) need – shelter and services for mothers and their dependent children. Over the years NHHR has been recognized both locally and nationally as a leader in developing and implementing programs that address the causes of homelessness, as well as the symptoms. A recent program development is the creation of **SEARCH** (Services, Education & Activities Reaching Children who are Homeless), the only such program in New Haven and also in the State of CT.

Initially serving only the children in NHHR's shelters, it now includes all of the children in all of the shelters in New Haven under a recently formed collaborative – The Children's Education Partnership (CEP). In the past, shelters would support the mothers as they strived to address the issues that caused them to be homeless – domestic violence, extreme poverty, child abuse, trauma, etc., and it is now very clear that we must address the serious problems that homeless children face

Currently, we operate two shelters which are the entry points into a solution-oriented system, and four supportive housing programs. The latter is in collaboration with other agencies and service providers. For more detailed program information click on www.nhhr.org.
